

Dear Potential Visitors to Peehee mu'huh,

Protect Thacker Pass camp is located on Paiute-Shoshone land, and we work in solidarity with Atsa koodakuh wyh Nuwu (The People of Red Mountain).

They have asked that people do not participate in indigenous ceremonial events (including community meals before and after) when menstruating. Many traditional Paiute-Shoshone people believe that the powerful energy of "moon time" can interfere with ceremonies.

These beliefs are widespread on Paiute land. Similar requests were made of visitors to Standing Rock water protector camps.

While not everyone holds to the same beliefs, we ask that visitors respect this request. Ceremonial events typically take place on some weekend days, last a few hours, and usually take place at the lower camp. You should also request to talk to a female if you prefer. If you arrive at Peehee mu'huh during a ceremonial event during your moon-time, please proceed to the upper camp area, up the hill on the right, rather than to the event area lower down the hill on the left. If you have questions, or want to learn about alternatives during ceremonial events, feel free to reach out to us.
